This course is designed to provide students with an overview of discourse texts in a variety of genres and styles and traditional methods of discourse analysis. In addition, the course will help students explore the world of corpora and engage in hands-on analysis of big-scale language data. Equipped with new analytical methodologies of language and discourse, students will have a better understanding of contemporary culture embedded in every day use of language.
